A Southport Anniversary Special Event

April 28, 2017 - Southport, MB

On April 28th, Southport held a special event to celebrate their 25th anniversary.

Citizens of Portage la Prairie, tenants at Southport, including students and instructors at 3 Canadian Forces Flight Training School (3CFFTS), special guests and dignitaries gathered to witness a commemorative dedication in honour of 25 years of military flight training.

Military flight training has been carried out under private contract at Southport since 1992, when Southport assumed the airport, buildings and infrastructure of the former CFB Portage la Prairie. Currently, KF Aerospace is contracted to carry out military flight training at Southport for 3CFFTS.

At the event, Southport unveiled a CT-114 Tutor which will be installed as a static display with a commemorative plaque in the interpretive park at Southport.

This choice of aircraft has historical significance: the CT-114 Tutor is one of the aircraft that was once used to train pilots at CFB Portage la Prairie.

In addition, the aircraft is painted in the Golden Centennaire colours. The Golden Centennaires were a formed as an aerobatic team of eight CT-114 Tutors in 1967, established for the purpose of celebrating Canada's Centennial Anniversary. The team only performed for one year. 2017, the 150th Anniversary of Canada's Confederation, marks their 50th anniversary.

The event also included speeches from Peggy May, Southport CEO; Paulette Connery, Southport Board Chair; The Honourable Brian Pallister, Premier of Manitoba; Mayor Irvine Ferris, City of Portage la Prairie; Reeve Kam Blight, RM of Portage la Prairie; BGen Dave Cochrane, 2 Canadian Air Division Commander.

After the speeches, guests were treated to a surprise flyover from the Canadian Forces Snowbirds. The Snowbirds, with their iconic red and white palette, continue to fly the CF-114 Tutor and will perform all

across Canada this year to celebrate Canada's 150th anniversary.
